

A Note from the Director

Welcome to our production of Women Who Weave.

Each SVSU Department of Theatre season, I read many plays to choose the play I would like to direct. I knew going into the 2024-2025 season I wanted to direct a Theatre for Young Audience's play but was not sure what kind of story I was interested in working on. I kept coming back to the *Women Who Weave* script for two reasons:

- · The style of storytelling.
- · The strong female hero.

The style of storytelling in *Women Who Weave* is called story theatre. There is a long history of the development of story theatre. It had a rise in popularity with the Paul Sills' directed Broadway production of a script he wrote using folk tales and fables called Story Theatre. As a TYA staple, story theatre has always been an amazing way to tell stories; characters fully engaged in action on stage while a narrator supports them creating wonderful storytelling. This type of storytelling is something I love to develop and direct. I hope you enjoy the way this story is told as much as I enjoyed being part of the process of creating the production.

I am always asking myself, "What kind of story do we need right now?" when I am choosing a script to direct. The answer I found this time was a story with a strong female protagonist. I wanted to spend time with actors developing a story about strong women and *Women Who Weave* does this remarkably well. Using Greek mythology from the female hero perspective (the women behind the celebrated Greek male heroes, Odysseus, Theseus, etc.), *Women Who Weave* has a conversation about gender roles and identity in a way that speaks to the middle school audience it is aimed toward. The protagonist Atalanta does not feel right in her own skin and finds it difficult to fit into society. Through the play, she encounters many characters and makes discoveries to come to terms with some of these ideas. It is a story that uplifts personal identity and female empowerment. It is a story I am excited to share with you as an audience member.

A Note from the Dramaturg

Women Who Weave by J.S. Puller is a story spun by The Fates, three women responsible for creating the tapestry of life by weaving together the threads of mortals and Gods alike. Each of the three Fates represented a specific step in weaving and creating life's tapestry. Clotho spun the thread, bringing the soul to life, Lachesis measured the thread, representing the length of life, and Atropos cut the thread, ending the journey of life. Throughout our story, The Fates spin the tale of three strong women: Penelope, Ariadne, and Philomel.

In Ancient Greece, weaving was an integral part of people's lives, so much so that Athena, the patron Goddess of Athens, was deemed the Goddess of handicraft, more specifically weaving. Weaving clothes and other textiles was more than a hobby or pastime for women at this time; it was a necessity. "Textiles have been used as swaddling for babies, as shrouds for the dead, as bandages, as tents, blankets, curtains, and also as containers for people, objects or food" (Brones 11). The act of weaving typically took weeks, from start to finish.


Although weaving today is considered a dying art due to the mass production of textiles, it still has many useful benefits. The cast and crew had the opportunity to visit The Tangled Web Handweavers Fiber Guild in Clio, MI where they were taught about weaving. Many of their members practice weaving as a hobby and find it to be relaxing due to the rhythmic and repetitive nature of weaving threads under and over the vertical warp threads before pressing it all down and starting the next layer.

The art of weaving is immensely intentional: one small mistake and you'd have to unravel everything until you could get to the mistake to fix it. This amount of forethought is represented in The Fates; they carefully spun lives together, measuring it just right to weave into the tapestry of life, and cutting the thread at the exact right time. Through The Fates, *Women Who Weave* shows how every life is intentional and full of meaning, down to the smallest details.

Stage Manager:



The aims of this national theater education program are to identify and promote quality in college-level theater production. To this end, each production entered is eligible for a response by a regional KCACTF representative, and selected students and faculty are invited to participate in KCACTF programs involving scholarships, internships, grants and awards for actors, directors, dramaturgs, playwrights, designers, stage managers and critics at both the regional and national levels.

Productions entered on the Participating level are eligible for invitation to the KCACTF regional festival and may also be considered for national awards recognizing outstanding achievement in production, design, direction and performance.

Last year more than 1,500 productions were entered in the KCACTF involving more than 200,000 students nationwide. By entering this production, our theater department is sharing in the KCACTF goals to recognize, reward, and celebrate the exemplary work produced in college and university theaters across the nation.
